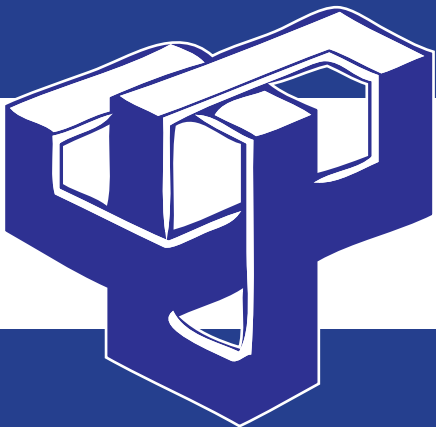

Top 5 Accomplishments

1. Transitioning – Coming into the CRC position, I believe that I got very little transition. There were many facets of the position that I did not know about and had to make up or figure my way around during the year. I feel like I was able to do a very good job with managing on my own (with very few files and resources). This year has been a true testament to learning and developing. It has challenged me in many ways and I believe that I have learned a lot in this first year as the CRC that will allow me to do some amazing things for this incredibly important resource of NACURH.

2. POY/SALT Newsletter – in an effort to market POY and SALT and the amazing programs that have been nominated for this year's awards, a newsletter was created for each award. It highlighted all the articles of the nominations that were submitted for each category. I believe that this has been an incredible step in the right direction to market both the POY and SALT awards as well as to share an incredibly important resource of NACURH. I look forward for these newsletters to become an important publication for member schools for years to come.

3. National Conference Staff – I have worked very diligently to assist and support the national conference staff. We have had weekly meetings (with both the Conference Advisor and the Conference Chair & NBD Liaison). UCSD had the unfortunate experience of hosting the NACURH conference during the year in which the CRC was new, and when the CRC had very little transition. However, I believe that we managed through the many issues that arose quite well. I think having worked so closely with this conference staff has allowed for many items to be created/implemented that will end up being very beneficial to the whole NACURH conference experience.

4. Forms/Documents – I have redone all the forms related to the position: Host School Acknowledgement Form and POY/SALT. Additionally, I have developed and/or redeveloped many other forms and documents that will become very useful in administering parts of conference hosting/planning as well as other NACURH processes. This year, the following documents have been worked on and will see their debut at NACURH 2010: The How To Bid For A Conference; The How To Host A Conference; The How To Write A Wrap Up Report. Each document has been done in the actual way of a bid or report. It will serve as a template for schools to just pull up and use so that writing their bid/report will be much easier.

5. Communication – it has been one of my major initiatives to improve communication from the role of the CRC and make sure that I am responding to e-mails, phone calls in a timely manner from member schools and other affiliates. I have made much contact with member schools this past year, and they have made a lot of contact with me. I believe that my quick response and attention to their questions/issues have truly allowed member schools to feel like they have been supported.

Top 5 Accomplishments

1. Strengthen Advisor relations by creating special Advisor gifts and socials during conferences.
2. Bidding, our region continues to make great strides in terms of bidding – this year over 50 bids were written and submitted.
3. New Cougars: Special focus was given to the regions youngest cougars. During the regional conference, delegates were given “pawspport to CAACURH” to welcome and inform them about the region.
4. Focus on the environment, this year CAACURH made strides by implementing flash drives for all of the NCCs during boardroom and is currently evaluating other ways to reduce waist.
5. Conference Website. CAACURH moved both conference websites on to its web server to ensure consistency between year to year.

Top 5 Goals for 2010 - 2011

1. Organize history and documents. Have a central location that has all past bids that are available, award winners, pin recipients, host schools, etc.
2. Website. Work with the board to overhaul the website. Including a history section, resource section, possibly blogs, etc.
3. CAACURH/NACURH Info Packet. Essentially create a recruiting tool as well as something new individuals of the region could have in order to inform about what exactly CAACURH/NACURH is.
4. Committees. In order to give the members of the region more responsibility and leadership opportunities CAACURH will explore creating committees.
5. Streamlining the policy book. This would involve trying to match the CAACURH policy up more so with the National Policy Book and reorganizing it in order for it to be more readable and accessible to member schools.

Traditions

Cougar the Campbell: CAACURH holds a regional points contest every conference. The schools that have participated in regional activities up until the conference have their names put in a drawing the host our plush cougar at the school. They host it until the next conference, and they pass along with it a diary with a picture of the mascot at their school.

Spirit Flag: The school that wins most spirited delegation at the fall regional conference gets to take home the CAACURH Spirit Flag and sew on a school patch. It is passed along every fall conference.

Top 5 Accomplishments

1. Full affiliation of eight (8) new member schools in a time during nationwide economic distress.
2. Received eighty (80) plus bid intents and had twenty (20) plus submitted bids by member schools.
3. A maximum capacity was reached for the annual conference with 567 delegates attending.
4. Five Canadian member schools were in attendance at the annual regional conference. This is the largest number of Canadian delegations GLACURH has seen in recent history.
5. GLACURH member schools raised \$3,000.00 in support of the Regional Philanthropy - the World Wildlife Fund. This money was used to adopt fifty-two (52) polar bears in the name of each member school. Schools received their adopted polar bears at No Frills 2010.

Top 5 Goals for 2010 - 2011

1. Encourage and improve involvement with conferences, whether it be through award bidding or hosting conferences.
2. Increase informal communication between member schools in between conferences.
3. Continue to strengthen and promote philanthropy efforts.
4. Work with conference staffs to ensure rich learning experiences, rather than rich entertainment.
5. Promote fiscally responsible regional conferences and RBD spending.

Traditions

Yearly Guides - Each year the regional board of directors publishes a number of guides for member schools. In the past year GLACURH has published a bidding and awards guide, philanthropy guide, RBD handbook, etc.

Technonology - In the past GLACURH has always tried to maintain the status quo with its technologies. This year's RCC for Communications and Development redesigned the GLACURH website and integrated ever popular technologies like Twitter and YouTube. By having these new technologies on our new and fresh-looking website, member schools and potential member schools are more drawn to our organization.

Regional Philanthropy - GLACURH has always had regional philanthropy; however, never has it been as energized as this year. Over \$2,700.00 was raised at GLACURH 2009 for the World Wildlife Fund. This would not have been possible without the support of the conference staff and their silent auction program. Additionally, member schools have been encouraged to host programs that are offered in the philanthropy guide to raise money for regional philanthropy.

Top 5 Accomplishments

1. **Scanning the RFI** - This year the NIC staff scanned about 70,000 pages of the RFI. After calculating how long it would take to scan the remaining filing cabinets, the staff in conjunction with the National Chair decided that it would be best for the member schools if scanning was out sourced. The National Board voted and approved funds for the RFI to be scanned by an outside company. The scanning will finish in the mid- summer and will be available through the RFI direct download system shortly thereafter.

2. **nacurh.org Redesign** - NACURH's website got its second make over this year. We have now switched to Wordpress and a content management system. This has made the look more professional and has made it easier to use. To edit the site, you no longer need to know any programming language making it easy for all NIC staff members to update the website. This will allow information to be disseminated faster. It will also make transitioning the site to a new host school easier.

3. **heyNACURH! Social Networking Site** - Many efforts have been made in the past few years to revitalize the vastly underutilized forum to no avail. This year heyNACURH!, NACURH's very first social networking site debuted and now has 338 members. Schools can share information, post pictures and videos from conferences or programs and connect with people across the country.

4. **RFI Direct Download** - To make the RFI more accessible to schools, the NIC wanted to create a direct download system on the website where schools could simply click on the files they wanted and download them immediately instead of submitting a request and waiting for the files to be scanned. This system is currently being created for free by CAACURH's own Colin Zimmerman.

5. **Successful Office Move** - The NIC has moved to a new location at NYU. The office was packed, moved and unpacked within a week and experienced virtually no down time. The move also allowed us to organize and inventory our resources which will prevent us from buying unnecessary supplies.

IX. ACUHO-I Report given by Norb Dunkel, ACUHO-I President

- a. It is an absolute pleasure to be with you today. This marks my 51st student conference. I served as an RHA adviser for many years and have logged more miles in a 15 passenger van than my own car. It is good to be back.

Let me share some information with you regarding ACUHO-I.

The Association of College and University Housing Officers – International has over 900 institutional members from 17 countries. We have approximately 200 business partners. Our Association represents 2.6 million students living in campus housing. This year we will be celebrating our 61st annual conference. Our Central Office is located in Columbus, Ohio under the supervision of Ms. Sallie Traxler, the Executive Director. Our ACUHO-I Research and Educational Foundation is chaired by Cindy Felice from the University of Maryland – College Park.

Highlights from this past year:

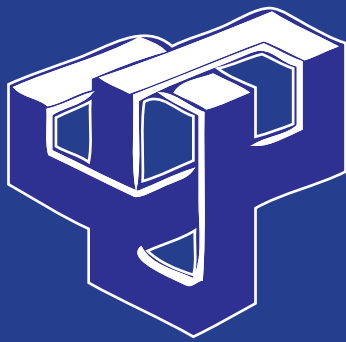
1. The 2008 – 2009 year was the first year with our new Executive Board governance structure. We have moved away from geographic representation to a functionally represented Board. We have the three year presidential cycle, the Finance and Corporate Records Officer, the ACUHO-I Executive Director as ex-officio and then directors for Globalization; Residence Education; Sustainability; Business Practices and Enhancements; Inclusion and Equity; Regional Affiliations; Facilities and Physical Environment; Knowledge Enhancement; and Workforce Development. The Board has performed wonderfully in their new roles.
2. This spring the ACUHO-I Executive Board and Central Office staff closely evaluated the Association's financial position using projection data from the Council of Higher Education Management Associations (CHEMA). We completed a budget adjustment of approximately \$350,000 or 11% to positively affect the Association's current financial position. During this time of economic downturn, it is even more important that our housing operations are provided the programs, services, and information needed to make informed, knowledgeable decisions. ACUHO-I will continue to provide those necessary tools. The Association is well-positioned financially to weather this down-turn.
3. ACUHO-I hosted a study tour in January to China. Twenty-six persons from five countries visited four college and universities in Guangzhou, Guiyang, Beijing, and Shanghai where they experienced and developed an understanding of the structure and practice of higher education and housing in different regions of China, and student needs when studying abroad. ACUHO-I also hosted the Global Housing Summit in Hong Kong which followed the China tour. About 85 senior housing and student affairs staff from 12 countries participated in the five day summit. The discussion resulted in the development of 8 major initiatives. These initiatives will be developed into a final document for ACUHO-I Executive Board consideration later this spring. While at the summit participants had the opportunity to listen to the Hong Kong Housing Authority present on pre-cast concrete construction, toured residence halls on three campuses, and visited a large-scale science park which serves as a technology incubator and features all the tenants of the ACUHO-I 21st Century Project.
4. Our ACUHO-I Annual Conference and Exposition is in Baltimore, Maryland from June 27 – 30, 2009. Our keynote speaker is sustainability and environmental activist Robert Kennedy, Jr. Our scholar-in-residence is Dr. Susan Komives and the featured speaker is Dr. George Kuh who will speak on what matters to student success. We anticipate about 1000 in attendance this year.
5. This fall, the Association offers the October Conference Series. The ACUHO-I Living Learning Programs Conference, ACUHO-I Apartments Conference, and ACUHO-I/APPA Facilities Conference are great opportunities for continued professional development. We have also reshaped and developed a new ACUHO-I Business Operations Conference that considers assignments, conference services, marketing, information technology, and business services into their knowledge content. All these conferences will be held in Columbus, Ohio.
